2022 Summary of Giving

The J. J. Keller Foundation grants are designed to support our community partners in a variety of ways.



Capacity Building Grants provide funding to help build an organization's ability to fulfill its mission more effectively or efficiently. A Challenge Match is part of the Capacity Building Grants to specifically help build the financial sustainability of the organization as it allows the nonprofit to stretch their fundraising impact with the Foundation's match for new or increased giving from donors.



Collaborative Grants provide funding that is leveraged in partnership with another philanthropic funder or collective impact organization. The Foundation's relationship with the Basic Needs Giving Partnership is just one example of this collaborative funding model as well as supporting the J. J. Keller & Associates Matching Gifts Program and other collaborative initiatives.



Innovation and Proactive Grants are awards that either the Foundation initiates to address community needs, or a grant investment in a new model, program, or organization. Board Discretionary grants are also part of this funding category as the grant investment for an organization is identified and awarded at the direction of the Board members.



Program Support Grants are restricted to a specific program within an organization or a targeted geographic region.



Unrestricted Operating Support is the most flexible type of grant award as the nonprofit recipient can use the funding where it's needed the most without restrictions.

Milestone of Giving in 2022

In December 2022 the J. J. Keller Foundation celebrated

\$75 Million

in total giving since the establishment of the Foundation.

To honor this milestone, a surprise \$75,000 grant to address mental health was awarded to Catalpa Health. The Foundation has served as a key partner of Catalpa's since its inception and continues to support their mission to help children and families improve their mental health and well-being. The grant was restricted to the Care Management Program.

Tracy Guiou, CEO and President of Catalpa Health shared "when Ethel Keller and likeminded community advocates challenged the health care systems to do better by the children in the Fox Cities, they were leading a progressive and collaborative initiative like no other."

Guiou explains that at Catalpa Health, our Care Management team helps our highest need families through transitions of care including inpatient hospitalization and posthospitalization care, along with urgent and crisis visits.

In 2022 the Care Management team served 960 unique clients with over 3,600 connections.

In serving these 960 clients, the team handled requests falling into the following categories:

528 hospital discharges/transitions

376 suicidal ideation triages

148 hospitalizations

95 urgent needs and

30 resource links.

Over the last few years, Catalpa Health has expanded our team to support the increased workload of our clinical staff, take ongoing referrals, work more with local nonprofits, provide necessities in our lobby, and use more Care Management resources in the Intensive Outpatient Program to support teens with a higher level of need. As we continue to see success and more requests for these services, we are even more aware of the needs these services are fulfilling, and we are grateful to our community partners, including the J. J. Keller Foundation, for their support.

Apricity

UNRESTRICTED OPERATING SUPPORT

66 When I started drinking, I was 16. I spent 40-years chained to my addiction. Fast forward to the conclusion of my second attempt at a 28-day treatment program. I realized that was not going to be enough. From here, I decided to come to Apricity's Casa Clare Residential Treatment in Appleton.

Casa Clare gave me my life back.

I was never taught about the disease of addiction prior to coming to Apricity. It is here I learned how to live with my addiction. Once I was equipped with healthy coping skills, I moved into Casa Clare's Residential Treatment Apartment Program, where I spent almost a year continuing with treatment and where I started working at Apricity Contract Packaging.

Being surrounded by a healthy and trustworthy support network both at treatment and contract packaging gave me confidence to move on to Apricity's women Sober Living House. I soon became the House Manager, a position I held for 2-years.

In July 2022, I celebrated four years of recovery, completely substance-free. During those three years, I obtained my driver's license for the first time - at age 55! Through my successful employment and sustained recovery, I was

also able to purchase my very first car. I also moved out of Sober Living and got my very own place to live. With the strength I built, healthy choices I made, and good advice I obtained every step of the way from the

people in Apricity's programs, the dream of owning a car and having my own place to live became a reality.

The people I've met through Apricity became my family. Many of the women from Sober Living are my sisters, and I would not give them up for anyone. The women that I lived with and the people I work with yet today at contract packaging have helped shape my life, and I would like to think I have done the same for them.

I want to let others know Apricity's programs work. Look at me - 40 years of chains broken!

Big Brothers Big Sisters of East Central Wisconsin

UNRESTRICTED OPERATING SUPPORT & CHALLENGE MATCH GRANT

Big Sister Katherine and Little Sister Hailey have been matched for 5 years in our community-based mentoring program. Hailey's mom signed her up for the program because Hailey's father is not in her life and her mom was looking for someone for Hailey to confide in other than her. Hailey is an only child, and this program would help her get out into the community and try new activities. Katherine was looking to be a Big to give a child the opportunities she had growing up.

Recently Hailey has been struggling with her mental health. She was hospitalized twice in the past year. Sadly, that made it so that Katherine couldn't see Hailey for a while because she was in and out of the hospital, but Katherine never gave up fighting for Hailey. She stuck by Hailey's side and was very concerned about her. Katherine continuously checked in with Hailey's mom to make sure Hailey was okay and to let her know she was thinking of her. Katherine wanted to make sure she could support Hailey in the best way possible, so she took several mental health training courses through BBBS and other community resources, to help her through her recovery.

When the time was right Katherine and Hailey started meeting consistently again and it's having

a very positive impact on Hailey's mental health.

YOUTH & FAMILY PROGRAMMING SUPPORT

The Boys & Girls Club of Oshkosh has always been dedicated to promoting positive mental health for youth. Since having a Director of Social & Emotional Wellness, and our recently added Behavior Intervention Specialist, we've been able to expand on our mental health and wellness programming to further benefit the kids we serve.

Through these programs, the Club is

seeing children and teens with improved behaviors and using healthier ways to express their emotions.

For example, Club member Jason* worked with Club staff over the fall to develop healthy coping strategies and communication skills when facing conflicts with friends.

Jason was struggling to voice his emotions and would often times communicate in ways that created conflict. Through

individual meetings, he learned ways to communicate effectively and voice his feelings when he felt upset instead of communicating in a passive-aggressive way. Now Jason feels confident that he can handle situations with friends on his own and feels **empowered to communicate in a healthier way.**

The Club looks forward to expanding mental health services, college readiness, and workforce development even further with the completion of its Community Center, part of the Club's 5-part building expansion project. Here, other organizations will collaborate to support the needs of youth and families in Oshkosh. The Community Center is set for completion in February 2024.

SKILLS ENHANCEMENT AND COMMUNITY RESOURCE TEAM PROGRAM SUPPORT

The Community Resource Team received a call from a woman in New Jersey who was looking for assistance for her relatives in Appleton. She explained that her family members didn't speak English and felt hopeless during a very serious time of crisis because they had no friends or family in the area and didn't know about local resources. With contact information from the caller, CAP's Community Resource Specialist reached out to the family.

Upon making contact, staff learned that the family of four were immigrants experiencing a housing crisis. The father owns a small auto shop. He contracted COVID-19 and was hospitalized for a couple weeks, and long-haul symptoms of the virus prevented him from working for many weeks afterward. The mother is a homemaker and assistant at the auto shop. She struggled to address the family's lack of income, particularly because she does not speak English and doesn't possess enough skills to navigate online applications. At the point when our Community Resource Specialist made contact, the family was four months behind on rent and was facing eviction.

CAP's bilingual staff explained the assistance available to this family, helped them navigate the application process, facilitated collection of documentation, and stayed in communication with the family about updates to the case. With this support, the family received assistance for back rent and three future months to address housing stability while they worked to resolve their financial concerns. CAP also connected them with utility and internet assistance to reduce the demands on their limited income.

This family now knows that by calling CAP Services, they can immediately connect to a Spanish-speaking staff member who will provide them with information about services and programs in the community. They have developed trust in CAP due to the care and consideration provided during that first crisis. They are still working to rebuild their financial security, but they have gained the knowledge and confidence to reach out to CAP for further assistance, including requesting and receiving additional months of rental assistance

Lifting the Voices and Work of Our Partners

Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Brown County

RECRUITMENT, SCREENING, TRAINING AND SUPERVISION FOR CASA VOLUNTEERS IN BROWN COUNTY PROGRAM SUPPORT

Clare* was 14 when she experienced abuse from a parent who struggled with drug addiction. Clare was removed from her home and placed in foster care, along with her younger siblings.

The court appointed a CASA volunteer, Anna*, to advocate on behalf of Clare and tell her unique story through reports to the judge.

Clare shares that "[Anna] did a good job speaking for what I wanted. She gave me something to look forward to each week. I felt cared for and loved."

Anna helped Clare stay on top of her schoolwork and also advocated for mental health services.

Clare also found stress relief through CASA youth events where she could be around other kids who understood her experience.

Due in large part to Anna's consistent advocacy, Clare was able to overcome a lot of barriers.

After aging out of foster care, Clare graduated high school, has a job, lives on her own, and got her driver's license!

Clare shares that "CASA provided me with a sense of community, comfort, stability, and joy when I didn't really have that as a kid."

In 2022, 130 CASA volunteers advocated for the best interest of 223 children making their lives safer and their futures brighter.

Fox Valley Literacy

UNRESTRICTED OPERATING SUPPORT

Mateo came to the United States in 2019 and struggled to find good work. In his South American country, he had worked as an engineer but couldn't get comparable work here in the Fox Cities when he arrived. After a few months a friend referred him to Fox Valley Literacy. Just before the pandemic started in 2020, he had an intake meeting to help set goals and see where Fox Valley Literacy could help. Because he had a specialized need, we couldn't just match him with any tutor; the tutor had to understand the engineering concepts and processes that Mateo knew and needed to get back into his professional field. While there's always a waiting list for tutors at Fox Valley Literacy, it was complicated to find a tutor who was available, willing to work in a pandemic, and had enough knowledge to understand and translate engineering concepts for a non-native English speaker! Luckily enough we were able to

find a new retired engineer from a local manufacturing firm who was up for the challenge! They met a few weeks into the Covid-19 shut-down in April of 2020 and continued to work and study through all the changes that came at them in the pandemic. Just recently Mateo was able to start a new position at a local product manufacturing company using his engineering skills and experience in a way that

built upon his past and opens up his future!

Lifting the Voices and Work of Our Partners

Oshkosh Area **Community Pantry**

INCREASE FOOD ACCESS AND AVAILABILITY PROGRAM SUPPORT

The Oshkosh Area Community Pantry (OACP) had the pleasure of welcoming a new guest who was experiencing a difficult time. The guest shared with OACP staff that while she has a good job, her funds are having to be diverted to keeping her two teenage boys safe, as she works through separating from her abusive spouse. Here at OACP we cannot help with temporary housing, legal, or court fees. However, we can help make sure this guest and her family are fed while they work through becoming reestablished again, whenever that may be. This is just one of many examples of how food insecurity can affect so many, for

different reasons. The guest shared, "I didn't know how my family would be able to get food this week until I found about your organization."

The power of community contributions allows OACP to continue to provide services to individuals facing hardship in their life for a variety of reasons.

Pillars, Inc. & COTS, Inc.

UNRESTRICTED OPERATING SUPPORT

"Aaron" struggled with a serious meth addiction. He was in and out of Pillars Adult Shelter as his drug use and difficult behavior threatened shelter safety. After many second chances, Aaron's choices landed him indefinitely on Pillars' no-service list.

His drug use led to jail time. When his sentence was up, he entered treatment for his addiction. He knew this was his last shot. After treatment, he had nowhere to go unless he could convince Pillars to re-admit him.

In treatment, Aaron developed healthy ways to cope. He managed to stay sober. He communicated consistently with his parole officer and state veteran worker. After completing treatment, he returned to Pillars to request an override of his no-service exit.

Aaron wrote about his experiences in detail, describing his jail time, his subsequent treatment, and his desire for a safe place to stay while continuing to work on his sobriety. It was clear to Pillars staff that he was in an entirely different place. His no-service status was overridden, with joy.

Aaron had years of experience as a chef. He found full-time work in his favored field and began building savings while staying at Pillars Adult Shelter.

Wayne, his case manager, connected him to COTS and to veterans housing. Aaron opted for COTS, knowing he still needed the extra support the program would provide. He left Pillars for COTS with a couple bags of belongings, a care package, and a fresh start.

At COTS, Aaron continues to focus on his sobriety while saving and building a positive rental history. Now, he looks forward to living more independently in supportive veterans housing.

Thanks to the J. J. Keller Foundation's ongoing funding, people like Aaron always have an

opportunity for a fresh start

when they are ready and determined to embrace it.

Rebuilding Together Fox Valley

NATIONAL REBUILDING DAY PROGRAM SUPPORT

Together, Rebuilding Together Fox Valley and community partners have been able to have a huge impact on our community in 2022! Rebuilding Together makes critical repairs at no charge for low-income homeowners and nonprofit organizations. Our volunteers make homes safe and healthy, and they help individuals age in place. We give special priority to older adults, people living with disabilities, families with children and veterans.

We often hear from our homeowners as they share the life changing impact of this work. This homeowner shared, "Thank you for installing grab bars in our home showers. I knew the work needed to be done for my husband with Alzheimer's, but I had no idea who to call. Your service was professional, and we are so pleased with the results. We are so very grateful!"

In 2022, Rebuilding Together was able to make

1,045 home modifications and repairs
benefiting 221 individuals in 138 homes

46% are living with a disability
64% are older adults
100% are low income
40% are female heads of household
28% are Veterans

This work is made possible with our extraordinary volunteers. In 2022, 502 volunteers contributed 2,264 hours of service to our mission, generating \$55,807.60 of in-kind labor.



BASIC NEEDS PROGRAM SUPPORT


One Friday morning, a young mom with four children called SVdP to request financial assistance. The woman needed groceries and rental assistance. She was unable to drive to the food pantry as she had no money to put gas in her vehicle. A pair of SVdP's trained volunteers were able to immediately meet the woman at her home. SVdP was able to provide food, rental assistance, and a gas card. More importantly, the volunteers were able to listen and compassionately assist in providing other referrals such as childcare resources and job opportunities. Receiving a simple gallon of milk and other groceries for her and her children brought her comfort knowing her children would be cared for.

Our role at St. Vincent de Paul Appleton (SVdP) is to listen to our neighbor in need without judgment, on their time, and in their home. SVdP's Basic Needs Program focuses on providing a compassionate listening ear, merchandise, and financial assistance to help people meet their basic needs for clothing, food, and shelter. SVdP also helps with immigration costs and advocacy, medical bills, utilities, transportation, and other unique requests for assistance. We often find during the home visit, the need is more than financial assistance, it is more that we can listen to what their needs are. We can offer mentoring, advocacy, financial assistance, and help navigating other community resources.

We sit with them in their home and listen to them talk about their circumstances. There is no judging. Many of the people we visit are just trying to get through the day. They are stressed and often do not have the support of family or friends. During that time, I hope they feel heard and that they have hope. SVdP Home Visitor.

DENTAL BUS PROGRAM SUPPORT

Brothers Michael and Malakai Weiss Hickman visited the mobile dental clinic at Franklin Elementary in Oshkosh in January 2022 as part of the Robert Glass Focus on the Children program. The J. J. Keller Foundation grant in 2022 supported the Dental Bus program to

provide kids access to dental care. Both brothers received an

exam, bitewing x-rays, a thorough cleaning, oral hygiene instruction, and fluoride varnish treatments.

Big brother Michael had received the same services last year. After decay was detected on his primary molars, silver diamine fluoride (SDF) was applied to slow the progression until the areas could be restored by Marquette University dental students under the supervision of volunteer dentist Jacci Belter. Sealants were also placed on his permanent six-year molars to prevent decay.

Now in first grade, Michael is cavity-free! Little brother Malakai is in kindergarten and it's his first year in the program. He's missing a couple of teeth but is also cavity-free!


In addition to the other services provided, he was able to have sealants placed on two six-year molars.

These two siblings have received a combined total of \$2,646 of free dental care, all completed on the mobile dental clinic at their school. Not only is the "dental bus" fun for these students but having a dental clinic at their school minimizes the amount of time they miss school for a dental appointment. This is great for both the student and their parents!

The Partnership will live by the shared values of trust and collaboration, curiosity and learning, and equity with a systems-based approach as it works towards the vision of thriving, equitable communities across Northeast Wisconsin.

Difference Maker Hours

252 associates used their benefit of up to 4 paid Difference Maker Hours per year for over 1,571 hours of volunteering for Habitat for Humanity, Feeding America, and other focus areas of giving for the company.





Transforming Lives and Team Building with Greater Fox Cities Habitat for Humanity

J. J. Keller & Associates constructed its 19th Greater Fox Cities Habitat for Humanity home in 2022 with teams of associates volunteering their time. This included 187 crew members and 19 meal providers for a total of 206 volunteers. The J. J. Keller Foundation partnered by providing a grant to Greater Fox Cities Habitat for Humanity to support the new home construction for a family of 10.

Salvation Army & Red Kettle Bell Ringers

In 2022, using Difference Maker Hours, teams of associates answered the call to ring bells for the Salvation Army in the Fox Cities, Oshkosh and beyond. The J. J. Keller Foundation matched \$50,000 in giving on the Foundation Match Days in Green Bay, Oshkosh and the Fox Cities.





Feeding America Eastern Wisconsin – Mobile Food Pantry

In November 2022 associates partnered with Feeding America Eastern Wisconsin to offer a mobile food pantry in the J. J. Keller & Associates parking lot to support our community facing food insecurity. The J. J. Keller Foundation supported this mobile food pantry with a \$7,500 grant.

WIT4Girls Workshop (Women in Technology Wisconsin)

J. J. Keller associates also lead by example in volunteering their specialized talents with other organizations such as Women in Technology Wisconsin and its WIT4Girls event. Here, girls discover the power and fun of coding and the possibilities of careers in Information Technology. The J. J. Keller Foundation provided a grant so each girl could take home the device they programmed at the event.



United Way

Associates gave to United Way in their local communities across the country to help advance programming and improve quality of life in the place they call home. Associates made pledges to United Way across the U.S., and the J. J. Keller Foundation matched pledges to United Way in the Fox Cities, Oshkosh, and Brown County with \$31,831 across those three agencies.
